ENTRIES WILL ONLY BE ACCEPTED IF ACCOMPANIED
BY ALL THE PAPERWORK LISTED ABOVE.

1. Refer to Rules & Regulations for all Livestock Shows (Page 23) and to the Health Rules for Equines (Page 25)
2. **NEW RULE: ALL EXHIBITORS MUST PROVIDE THEIR OWN BEDDING & FEED. Sawdust will NOT be provided by the Farm Show; ground fees will NOT be charged.**
3. All classes must be pre-entered by July 14. **RINGSIDE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.**
4. Exhibitors must have an exhibitor's number. Call the office in July to obtain a new number or retrieve your number from previous years.
5. Entries must be in the stalls on the grounds by 9:00 a.m. on Monday of Farm Show week. **EQUINES MAY NOT COME IN BEFORE FRIDAY, AUGUST 7.**
6. Check in time for equine exhibitors is 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Sunday evening at Elmer's Camper.
7. Release time is 9:00 p.m. Saturday of Farm Show week.
8. The Farm Show reserves the right to refuse any or all entries.
9. Decisions of the Horse Show Committee take precedence over all written material.
10. Any complaints must be made through the show committee. Anyone not doing so may be asked to leave the Farm Show and forfeit any premiums.
11. All stallions must be tied at all times. No exhibitor under the age of 18, as of January 1, is permitted to handle or show a stallion. Grade stallions may NOT be entered.

12. An entered equine must be shown and compete in only one halter class except in group classes. Hitch classes are optional.
13. Any horse or team of horses shall NOT be entitled to a premium unless serviceably sound.
14. Horses entered as matched pairs must be owned by one person or firm.
15. Box stalls are for MARE AND FOAL only. Single horses will use tie stalls.
16. No one is permitted to stay or sleep in the barn overnight.
17. Stalls and walkways must be kept clean and free from clutter at all times.
18. Exhibitors not cleaning stalls at close of Farm Show will forfeit their premium money.
19. **ALL HANDLERS & DRIVERS OF DRAFT HORSES MUST BE 8 YEARS OLD OR OLDER AND ACCOMPANIED BY AN EXPERIENCED ADULT DRIVER.**
20. **ANY DRIVER UNDER 18 YEARS OF AGE (AS OF JANUARY 1) MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY AN EXPERIENCED ADULT DRIVER AND HEADER.**
21. Equines must be entered in the proper sections and classes on the appropriate entry form. If you are not able to participate in an entered class, notify announcer BEFORE the class begins. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the breed of livestock they are entering. Any animal entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a premium.
22. All classes will begin at the time scheduled in the premium book. The book will be followed. Class will be announced 5 minutes before the gates are closed. Time will be allowed between multiple hitch classes. Only enter the classes for which you can be ready. If changes are necessary due to an error in the book or unforeseen circumstances, they will be posted in the barn and followed accordingly. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to be aware of the schedule and have the animals in the arena on time. Failure to comply with this rule renders the exhibitor liable to be ruled out of competing.
23. You MUST enter the show arena at a flat walk and continue at a walk around the ring. You will not be judged at this time. The announcer will tell you when judging begins. It will be determined if all entries are safe. If an entry is determined not to be safe, that entry will be dismissed.
24. **All clothing that is worn in the show arena (including any helpers, headers, or trailers and regular or fun classes) shall be clean and neat. Shirts must have a collar and sleeves (long or short). Shoes must be hard-soled.** Unacceptable clothing includes T-shirts, tank tops, sleeveless shirts, and tennis shoes. Violators will be excused from the ring by show committee. NO EXCEPTIONS.
25. **Only the exhibitor and those having official or requested duties to perform will be allowed in the show ring and the announcer's booth during the time of judging.**
26. **AN EXHIBITOR SHALL NOT APPROACH A JUDGE WHILE ANY SESSION OF THE SHOW IS IN PROGRESS.** If an exhibitor wishes to discuss a horse or class with the judge, he must wait until the classes finish.
27. The Farm Show reserves the right to prohibit any person from attending or showing a horse in the show arena without being liable for compensation or damages.

RULES FOR ALL HITCH CLASSES**

- Horses may be purebred or grade but must have been shown in the appropriate preceding halter class.
- Only one family or one farm unit may hitch in combination.
- All hitches must be judged, not just brought in for exhibition.
- Drivers for hitch classes must be 8 years or older, as of January 1, and of a competent nature.
- Any entry that is deemed unsafe or unfit in any way may be excused from competition by the Horse Committee.
- Adult drivers are 18 years and over. Senior drivers must be 13 through 18 years of age. Junior drivers must be 8 through 12 years old. (All ages as of January 1 of the current year.)**
- Novice and any driver under 18 years of age (as January 1) MUST be accompanied by an experienced adult driver and header.**

THE DECISION OF THE HEALTH AGENT IS FINAL.
- All goats must have permanent and legible tattoos in accordance with the ADGA rules. Re-tattoos are acceptable when said tattoo matches the legible digits of the original tattoo, is in the same ear as the original tattoo, and an appropriate notification appears on the animal's registration certificate.
- All livestock offered for premiums must be the property of the owner 30 days or longer and must be in the name of the exhibitor. An exhibitor shall not present an animal to be shown under a judge from whom it was purchased within 90 days of the show.

Litter must also be of the same breeding. Small breeds must have a minimum of 2 young. Medium and large breeds must have a minimum of 4 young. Please list the number of young in the litter on entry.
7. Meat pens may be entered. Only recognized commercial breeds accepted, including commercial cross breeds. (They must consist of three rabbits 8 to 10 weeks of age, weighing 3-5 lbs. each.) Two entries permitted.
8. Junior animals MUST be at least 3 MONTHS OLD.
9. Show breed, variety, sex, class, & ear tattoo on entry form.
10. Exhibitors are responsible for feeding and watering their animals and keeping the cooping in a sanitary condition daily. Animals MUST be fed and watered at time of cooping.
11. Feed and water containers, and cleaning implements will be provided. Double cooping will be provided for meat pens, does and litters and rabbits weighing more than 10 pounds.
12. Exhibitors MUST provide their own feed and bedding, using wood chips but not straw, hay or sawdust.

WHAT'S THE REAL PURPOSE OF YOUTH (4-H & FFA) LIVESTOCK PROJECTS

One purpose is to teach young people how to feed, fit, and show their animals. The more important purpose is to provide an opportunity for personal growth and development of the young person.

The Josephson Institute of Ethics has developed a curriculum which identifies six core values which may help to better describe the value of youth livestock projects. This curriculum also presents the idea that people develop and strengthen character by practicing certain behaviors just as muscles are built through exercise.

Therefore, the purpose of the youth livestock program (4-H and FFA) is to provide opportunities for young people to develop character. The character traits identified and some practices (exercises) that may build character follow:

- A. Trustworthiness - includes honesty, promise keeping and loyalty
 - daily feeding, watering of animals (promise keeping)
 - adheres to possession deadlines (honesty)
 - adheres to withdrawal times on drugs and de-wormer
 - only the appropriate use of approved drugs
- B. Respect - includes courtesy and proper treatment of people and things.
 - proper handling of animals, treat humanely
 - proper care of animals
 - listens to and follows advice of advisors
 - recognizes that animal projects are dependent on 4-H'er and provides daily feed and water
- C. Responsibility - includes the pursuit of excellence, accountability and perseverance.
 - daily feeding and watering (even on the busy, difficult days)
 - goes beyond providing the daily needs of the animal in giving additional time and attention to produce a winner
 - adheres to deadlines for entry forms and for arrival at livestock shows
 - never gives up in the show ring (perseverance)
- D. Fairness - involves consistently applying rules and standards appropriately to different age groups and ability levels.
 - feed only approved livestock rations
 - only the appropriate use of approved drugs
 - accepts winning or losing with grace
 - conduct in the show ring follows recommended procedure
 - fitting and grooming of animals follows recommended procedures
- E. Caring - promoting the well being of people and things in a young person's world. It denotes action and not just feelings.
 - daily feeding and watering
 - provides clean barn/stall for animal
 - treats animal humanely at all times
- F. Citizenship - includes making the home community and county a better place to live for themselves and others.
 - accepting instructions
 - winning and losing with grace
 - helping others at stock shows
 - teaching younger members
 - treating animals humanely
 - ensuring that your meat animal is safe for consumption

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR ALL JUNIOR SHOWS

Eligibility: 4-H Club members must be between 8 and 18 by January 1 of the current year. Exhibitors must be 4-H members, carrying a project in the field in which they wish to make entry, and be under the supervision of the Penn State University Cooperative Extension Service by June 1 preceding the Farm Show.

Students enrolled in an accepted vocational school curriculum must be conducting a project in the class in which they wish to make entry. Students enrolled in general home economics in a comprehensive high school are considered as qualifying. All entries shall be approved prior to the fair by a member of the PA Department of Education, Agriculture or Home Economics staff or their designated representative.

NOTE: A valid 4-H project not listed in the Farm Show Book may be accepted upon approval of Farm Show and Extension service. (Animal projects not listed cannot be accommodated.)

- Any boy or girl, who is a member of a 4-H club or a Future Farmers of America Chapter in Butler County is eligible to enter and compete. Projects must be carried in a Butler County 4-H club or Butler County Future Farmer of America Chapter.
- ENTRIES MUST BE RECEIVED BY JULY 14. SUBMIT A SEPARATE ENTRY FORM FOR EACH SPECIES FOR EACH EXHIBITOR. The OPEN classes for dairy, beef, goats, poultry and rabbits may be entered on the same entry form, but you must include the required entry fees. Entry fees ARE NOT charged for Dept. 10.**
- A project designation form must have been submitted to the Butler County Extension Office by June 1 of the current year. Entries will be checked by an Extension Agent.
- Exhibitors must have an exhibitor's number. Call the office in July to obtain a new number or retrieve your number from previous years.
- Rules and regulations governing open classes will apply in vocational classes.
- EXHIBITS ARE NOT TO BE REMOVED UNTIL SATURDAY 9:00 P.M. ANYONE REMOVING THEIR EXHIBIT BEFORE 9:00 P.M. WILL NOT BE CONSIDERED FOR NEXT YEAR'S SHOW.**
- All exhibitors under the age of 18 staying on the grounds between the hours of 12 midnight and 5:00 a.m. must have a signed parental permission form designating another adult as a chaperone on file in the office and must carry an official card issued by the show secretary. The card may be obtained before the show or on Monday of the show.
- Show apparel consists of long pants or dress; collared shirt with sleeves; or 4-H or plain white T-shirt. It is recommended that proper shoes or boots be worn. Inappropriate apparel includes other T-shirts, baggy or cut-off pants, shorts, hats, sandals, and a logo shirt including farm logo.
- In the Dairy Show an exhibitor may enter up to 5 project animals but no more than 3 in any one class.

- All livestock entries must have proper identification (ear tag, legible tattoo, or ear notch). All breeding stock entries (beef, swine, sheep) (Jr. or Open) must have registration and identification papers ready at pens Sunday at 9:00 p.m.
- All Junior Show animals must comply with health regulations. (See separate listings in front of book.) Animals displaying any evidence of transmissible diseases will be removed from the show.
- Stags are not acceptable in Junior Market classes.
- All market animals of same species will be weighed on the same scale.
- Junior exhibitors must provide their own hay, grain, and equipment.
- All animals are required to be tied or penned and under control of the exhibitor when being shown or paraded.
- 4-H and FFA members are expected to be present and have control of their animals at the time of judging. If the 4-H or FFA member is unable to show their project animal, the show superintendent must be notified prior to judging and a substitute handler may be designated. Substitute handlers must be a current Butler County 4-H or FFA member. Examples of situations when a substitute handler may be designated include, but are not limited to, military service, illness, injury, or more than one animal to be exhibited in a class.
- All Jr. Show animals must meet weight restrictions to show or sell. Animals that do not meet weight restrictions must be taken home immediately after weigh-in. EXCEPTION: An animal that does not meet weight requirements may remain on the grounds if that is the only animal the exhibitor has for showmanship class.
- FITTING OF ALL YOUTH SHOW ANIMALS, WHILE AT THE BUTLER FARM SHOW, MUST BE DONE BY THE EXHIBITOR ONLY. BUTLER COUNTY 4-H, FFA MEMBERS AND PARENTS MAY PROVIDE ASSISTANCE. "ABSOLUTELY NO PROFESSIONAL" FITTERS ARE PERMITTED TO ASSIST 4-H OR FFA EXHIBITORS WITH THE YOUTH SHOW ANIMALS. NO EXCEPTIONS.
- All show animals must be fitted for all classes according to Butler Farm Show rules. Use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals, do not use it!
- IMPORTANT!**
UPON SLAUGHTER, IF TREATMENT WITH DRUGS, BIOLOGIES, OR ANY CHEMICAL FROM FITTING PRODUCTS IS THE CAUSE OF CONDEMNATION OF A CARCASS, THE LOSS OF THE CARCASS AND ANY OTHER DAMAGES WILL BE BORNE BY THE EXHIBITOR.
- IF THESE RULES ARE NOT FOLLOWED, ANIMAL WILL BE DISQUALIFIED.

BUTLER COUNTY JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE RULES GENERAL RULES

- The sale is open to junior exhibitors (4-H who are 8 to 18 years of age on January 1 of the year of the show/sale; FFA members who are 14 to 21 years of age). In order to sell livestock, a member must be in good standing and attend the number of meetings established by the attendance policies of the Butler County 4-H clubs or FFA chapters.
- A project book must be obtained and maintained and the animal(s) must be under the ownership and the care of 4-H or FFA member. An up-to-date project book must be submitted at final weigh-in at the Butler Farm Show.
- All animals must be entered in the Butler Farm Show and shown in the appropriate market animal class as determined by final weigh-in.
- All junior market show animals must meet weight restrictions to show or sell. Animals that do not meet weight restrictions must be taken home immediately after weigh-in. An animal that does not meet weight restrictions may remain on the Farm Show grounds if it is the only animal the exhibitor has for showmanship.**
- ANIMALS THAT ARE DISQUALIFIED FROM THEIR RESPECTIVE SHOW/CLASS WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE TO SELL.**
- All sale animals must be clean and properly fitted according to Butler Farm Show rules.
- Butler Farm Show Rules and Regulations for each species will be enforced.
- Each animal shall be sold by its owner. If the owner is unable to present the animal for sale for any legitimate reason, another junior exhibitor may be designated to sell the animal. This substitution must be approved by the sale committee chair and a minimum of two additional active sale committee members prior to the sale of the animal.
- Any Butler County 4-H or FFA member wanting to show a junior market animal at the Butler Farm Show but not wishing to consign to the sale must notify the sale committee immediately following the junior market animal show at the Butler Farm Show.
- A sale fee of 3% of the gross sale price will be charged to help defray sales expenses. The sale committee reserves the right to alter this commission as necessary to cover sale expenses.
- Each member is responsible for his/her animal, including feeding, watering, and general care, until the time it is delivered to the buyer.
- Each member is required to assist with promotional and sale-related activities as designated by the committee.
- Each member is responsible for writing a letter to the buyer thanking him/her for their patronage.
- ALL ANIMALS SOLD THROUGH THE SALE WILL BE PHOTOGRAPHED FOR AN 8 1/2" X 11" BUYER THANK-YOU FOR MEMBERS TO SEND TO THEIR RESPECTIVE BUYERS WITH THEIR PERSONAL THANK-YOU LETTER. PARTICIPATING 4-H AND FFA MEMBERS WILL BE REQUIRED TO HAVE THEIR SALE ANIMALS PHOTOGRAPHED AT A TIME DESIGNATED BY THE SALE COMMITTEE. IF THE EXHIBITOR IS NOT PRESENT FOR THE PHOTOGRAPH, A SUBSTITUTE HANDLER WILL BE DESIGNATED. A FEE, NOT TO EXCEED \$10.00, WILL BE DEDUCTED FROM THE SALE OF EACH ANIMAL TO COVER THE COST OF THE THANK-YOU PHOTOS. MEMBERS WILL RECEIVE A COPY OF THE PHOTO FOR THEIR PERSONAL RECORDS.**

- Project members will be limited to selling 3 lots at the sale. A lot is defined as a beef, a pig, a lamb, a goat, a pen of rabbits, or a pen of poultry. Members may sell a maximum of two lots per species.
- Animals that are designated as the Grand Champion and the Reserve Grand Champion for each species must be consigned to the Butler County Jr. Livestock Sale.
- Animals consigned to the sale must be delivered to the buyer or designated hauling agent. There will be no switching of animals after the sale.
- Junior Livestock Sale Rules and Regulations may be added or amended as the need arises by the Sale Committee.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE RULES BEEF/SHEEP/SWINE

- A project book must be obtained and maintained and the animal(s) must be under the ownership and the care of 4-H or FFA member as follows:
 - Beef Cattle** - Steers or heifers. Sired by a recognized beef breed sire and born after January 1st of the year of the preceding sale. Animals must be acquired by weigh-in/ tagging date. The suggested minimum weight is 450 pounds by weigh-in date.
 - Lambs** - Wethers or ewes. Animals must be acquired by weigh-in/tagging date. The suggested minimum weight is 40 pounds by weigh-in/tagging date. **ALL MARKET LAMBS MUST HAVE A SCRAPIE ID EARTAG OR OTHER APPROVED FORM OF SCRAPIE ID PRIOR TO ARRIVAL AT THE MAY WEIGH-IN.**
 - Swine** - Barrows or gilts. Animals must be acquired by weigh-in/tagging date. The suggested minimum weight is 50 pounds and the suggested maximum weight is 80 pounds by weigh-in date. Scrotum incisions must be healed.
- Weigh-in/tagging will be at a central location. Your project animal will be marked for identification, weighed, and examined for castration. Date, time, and location for weigh-in will be announced. To be eligible to sell in the Junior Livestock Sale, all beef, sheep, and swine must be tagged at the weigh-in/tagging site and date. To be eligible for the Rate-of-Gain awards, animals must be weighed and tagged at weigh-in/tagging. Members are responsible for transportation of their project animals to weigh-in/tagging.
- Beef Cattle** - Project calf must be dehorned and castrated prior to weigh-in-tagging. Weigh-in/tagging will be the third Saturday in November.
- Beef Cattle - AS PER PENN STATE UNIVERSITY 4-H LIABILITY INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS, YOUTH WHO DO NOT MEET THE MINIMUM AGE REQUIREMENT FOR 4-H MEMBERSHIP AT THE TIME OF THE BEEF WEIGH-IN (8 YEARS OF AGE AS OF JANUARY 1ST OF THE CURRENT YEAR) WILL NOT BE PERMITTED TO WEIGH AND TAG AT THAT TIME. IF THE YOUTH MEETS THE MINIMUM AGE REQUIREMENT BY JANUARY 1, IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING THE BEEF WEIGH-IN, HE/SHE MAY ENROLL IN THE MARKET BEEF PROJECT AND WILL BE PERMITTED TO TAG PROJECT ANIMALS. PROJECT ANIMALS MUST BE TAGGED AFTER JANUARY 1ST BUT BEFORE JANUARY 31ST. DESIGNATED PROJECT ANIMALS WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE FOR RATE-OF-GAIN AWARD.**
- Lambs** - Weigh-in/tagging will be the second Saturday in May.

6. **Swine** - Weigh in/tagging will be the second Saturday in May. The decision to tag swine on the farm or to weigh-in/tag at a central location will be based on current PA pseudo-rabies regulations.
7. **For sale purposes, a member may weigh-in/tag and show 2 steers, 4 lambs, and/or 4 hogs.**
8. Final weigh-in will be conducted according to the Butler Farm Show schedule. These rules follow the Butler Farm Show guidelines:
 - a. **Beef Cattle** - Must be trained to lead with a halter. They must weigh at least 1,000 pounds and not more than 1,500 pounds by final weigh-in at the Butler Farm Show.
 - b. **Lambs** - Must weigh at least 80 pounds and not more than 140 pounds by final weigh-in at the Farm Show.
 - c. **Swine** - Must weigh at least 220 pounds and not more than 280 pounds by final weigh-in at the Farm Show.
 - d. Any evidence of testicle development will be cause for disqualification from the show and sale.

MARKET GOAT

1. A project book must be obtained and maintained and the animal(s) must be under the ownership and the care of 4-H or FFA member by weigh-in/ tagging date.
2. Market goats must be born after November 1st of the year preceding the market show but with full baby teeth at final market show weigh-in.
3. **Market goats may be wethers or does.**
4. **ALL MARKET GOATS MUST BE NEATLY DISBUDED OR DEHORNED PRIOR TO ARRIVAL AT THE MAY WEIGH-IN. ANY SCURS FROM EITHER OF THESE PROCEDURES MUST NOT BE MORE THAN 1/2 INCH ABOVE THE SKULL AND MUST BE BLUNTED (NO POINTS) AT FINAL WEIGH-IN AT THE BUTLER FARM SHOW.**
5. **ALL MARKET GOATS MUST HAVE A SCRAPIE ID EARTAG OR OTHER APPROVED FORM OF SCRAPIE ID PRIOR TO ARRIVAL AT THE MAY WEIGH-IN.**
6. Market goats must be representative of the dairy and meat goat breeds ONLY. NO PYGMY GOATS.
7. Weigh-in/tagging will be at a central location. Your project animal will be marked for identification, weighed, and examined for castration. To be eligible for the Rate-of-Gain award and/or to sell in the Junior Livestock Sale, all market goats must be tagged at the weigh in-tagging site and date. Members are responsible for transporting their animals to weigh-in/ tagging.
8. Weigh in/tagging will be the second Saturday in May.
9. **Each member may weigh-in/tag and show 2 goats.**
10. Market goats must weigh a minimum of 60 pounds and not more than 140 pounds by final weigh-in at the Farm Show.
11. Market goat classes will be determined by weight, not by breed.

MARKET POULTRY PEN

1. **EACH MEMBER WILL BE ALLOWED TO WEIGH IN AND SHOW 2 MEAT PENS. (A MEAT PEN CONSISTS OF 4 BROILERS.)**
2. All meat pen chicks must be from the Chick Pool. Chick Pool chicks will be from a certified hatchery. Chicks will be provided to designated poultry project members 7 to 8 weeks prior to entry and weigh-in day at the Butler Farm Show.
3. **ALL PENS WILL BE WEIGHED ON THE SUNDAY IMMEDIATELY PRIOR TO THE OPENING DAY OF THE FARM SHOW BETWEEN 3 P.M. AND 4 P.M. EACH BIRD MUST WEIGH AT LEAST 6 POUNDS BUT NOT MORE THAN 10 POUNDS. ANY**

BIRDS NOT MEETING THESE WEIGHTS WILL NOT BE PENNED AND MUST BE REMOVED FROM THE BUTLER FARM SHOW GROUNDS BY 11 P.M. THAT EVENING.

4. All meat pens will be health checked at weigh-in **BY AN APPOINTED INSPECTOR.** Any bird brought to the Butler Farm Show that is not of market quality will be dismissed.
5. All poultry projects must be **clean**, healthy and free from deformities. Any of the following faults will result in disqualification of the pen:
 - a. Missing extremities (2 wings/2 legs)
 - b. Clipped wings
 - c. Curly toes
 - d. Parasites
 - e. **BRUISING**
6. The following items must be considered in a poultry meat pen:
 - a. Meat Type
 - b. Weight: Finish weight - **6 TO 10 POUNDS PER BIRD.**
 - c. Uniformity
7. Each member must fit and show their own birds. **OWNERS MUST CARE FOR THEIR OWN BIRDS DURING THE WEEK OF THE FARM SHOW.**
8. **BECAUSE OF THE DIET OF EACH MEAT PEN, FEED MUST BE PROVIDED BY THE OWNER. (THIS APPLIES TO ONLY MEAT PENS.)**
9. **THE OWNER WILL ALSO SUPPLY FEEDERS, WATER BOWLS, AND BEDDING FOR MEAT PENS ONLY.**
10. **THE OWNER WILL SUPPLY THEIR OWN WAGON AND CAGE TO DISPLAY THE BIRDS AT THE LIVESTOCK SALE.**
11. **POULTRY PROJECT BOOKS WILL BE COLLECTED, CHECKED, AND RETURNED TO THE MEMBER AT WEIGH-IN.**

RABBIT MEAT PENS

1. Rabbits entered in a meat pen must be bred, owned, and raised by the member.
2. **Entries showing signs of illness or disease at check-in will not be accepted and must be removed from the grounds.**
3. **Each member will be allowed to weigh-in and show 2 meat pens.**
4. Only recognized commercial breeds will be accepted.

5. Does of litters to be verified for meat pens must be designated project animals owned by the member. Rabbit project designation forms identifying does of meat pen litters must be submitted to the county extension office by the close of business on June 1st of the current year.
6. Meat pens must consist of 3 rabbits of the same breed and variety. They may be of different sexes.
7. Meat pen entries must be at least 8 weeks (54 days) of age, but not more than 10 weeks (70 days) of age by opening day

- of the Butler Farm Show.
8. Meat pen entries must weigh at least 3 pounds each but not more than 5 pounds by weigh-in at judging time at the Butler Farm Show.
9. Individual rabbits do not have to be litter mates but must be from verified, approved litters.
10. **Litter verification must take place within two weeks of birth.** Litter verifications may be made by a 4-H leader, FFA advisor, Butler County Extension educator, or a superintendent of the rabbit department of the Butler Farm Show.
11. A Litter Verification Sheet must accompany each entry. Entries will not be accepted without approved paper work.
12. Meat pens will be weighed at time of judging.
13. Meat pens will be judged on meat type, condition of flesh, uniformity of body and weight, and fur.

OPEN CLASSES MAY BE ENTERED BY SUBMITTING PROPER ENTRY FORMS AND PAYING ENTRY FEES

DEPT. 13 SECTION 1 - VEGETABLES (CONTINUED)

The following factors are generally used by an expert vegetable judge:

- a. Trueness to variety type. If at all possible, pick the specimens from one variety.
- b. Uniformity of shape, size and color.
- c. Pick a perfect specimen, then select the others as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens of different maturity.
- d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection, and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes.
- e. Potatoes should not be washed — Remove soil with soft cloth.
- f. Enter only exact amount of specimens.
- g. Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots and other root crops should have tops removed, leaving about 2" of stems.
- h. Exhibits to be in soil shall be potted at least 2 months prior to show.
